

**CITY OF NEWCASTLE UPON TYNE
TRAFFIC REGULATION (CONSOLIDATION) ORDER 2009
(CHESWICK DRIVE, GOSFORTH VARIATION) ORDER 2017**

1. **NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN** that the Council of the City of Newcastle upon Tyne propose to make an Order under Sections 1, 2, 4, 29 and Part IV of Schedule 9 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 which amends the City of Newcastle upon Tyne Traffic Regulation (Consolidation) Order 2009 (“the 2009 Order”). Note – the Council are currently in the process of making a new 2017 Consolidation Order (“the 2017 Order”). If the 2017 Order is made before the proposed Order, then the proposed Order will become an amendment to the 2017 Order.

2. The effect of the proposed Order is to introduce a no waiting at any time restriction (double yellow lines) on the following length of road -

Cheswick Drive, Gosforth – south side, from the east end of Cheswick Drive south westwards for 12.6 metres.

3. Documents giving more detailed particulars of the Order (including the draft Order, map and a statement of the Council’s reasons for proposing to make the Order), and the 2009 Order, may be viewed free of charge at
